FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

One message of the Advent season is that God's future is about to break upon us with a glory that dispels the gloom of our present situation. But there's another message which is that we must learn to wait for the future with creative and joyful expectation.

The problem with the idea of Advent being about waiting with creative and joyful expectation is that it can be taken as just one more bit of nicesounding but ultimately trivial liturgical claptrap. We know how the story ends, and so there's no surprise and no disappointment. We expect that, come Christmas Day, we will once again have presents and carols and turkey with all the trimmings. And since we know that all of our expectations will be met—or at least most of them will be—we will simply fill the intervening days and weeks with busyness and revelry and spending.

But to leave the notion of Advent expectation at that is to be content with a life lived in the shallows of existence. As Christians, you and I are called to sound the depths of our own souls, to delve into the mystery that is at the heart of things and to expect more out of life. If we don't believe that the future prospects for the world, or for ourselves, or for the Church are promising and hopeful, I think it's because we expect so little out of life, out of ourselves, and out of the Church. Low expectations yield low results and lead, ultimately, to dissipation and decay. How many people, for example, do you know whose expectation of Christmas is that it will be bleak and insufferable and lonely, a grim time to be endured? Yet do they ever do something to affect positive change, to make their experience of the season a little less dour and tedious? Or how many of us come to Church expecting nothing but a stultifying hour of the same old, same old? Imagine what would happen, what we could do, what sort of dynamism would burst forth, if we actually expected our hearts to be taken and set on fire!

We need to expect more, and this means that we need to learn to do more. It's a great temptation to simply sit around looking into the future without doing anything. If we expect good things to be right around the corner, we need to do something to help bring those good things to birth. Similarly, if we expect the future to be hostile, cold and disappointing, we need to do something to help to change the course of history. And if we expect to discover the truth of the birth of Christ for ourselves, we need to go out into the world and look for the places where he is most likely to be found: among the homeless, the marginalized, the disenfranchised. If we expect any of this to happen, we need to be God's active agents in the world.

So let us take to heart the Advent hope for the future by working to make this world a ready place for the desire of all nations. Amid all of the expectations—good and bad—that we have at this time of year, let us cling fast to the greatest of them all: that the Lord will indeed come and not be slow. He will come in the tiniest act of generosity and with the simplest word of love and in the smallest gesture of inclusion. What's more, he will come to the unlikeliest of places, in the most startling of guises and at the most surprising of times. But come he will, and so let us sing all the more of the future kingdom whose promise is greater than anything we could have ever imagined, and whose joyful fulfilment surpasses anything we could have ever expected.

THIS SUNDAY'S READINGS AND PRAYERS

Sunday, December 12, 2021 – Third Sunday of Advent

Zephaniah 3:14-20 Earlier in the chapter, the author has spoken of the failure of Jerusalem and her inhabitants to behave properly towards God. He has destroyed other nations as a warning to them. In spite of this, God will cause Gentiles to turn to his ways: they will serve him by permitting the Jewish exiles to return to Jerusalem.

Philippians 4:4-7 Paul tried to finish his letter earlier, but certain concerns about the community and its members intruded. In the Greek world, rejoice was used much as we say goodbye, but here Paul means rejoice literally.

Luke 3:7-18 John the Baptist travels throughout the Jordan Valley, preaching return to God's ways and adoption of an ethical way of life under God. Now he warns against being baptised without the intention to carry out its obligations. Those who behave in this way will be condemned at the end of the age.
